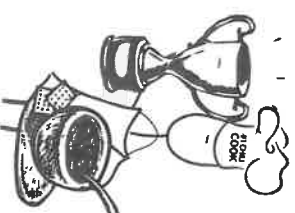


VALENTINE DAY – DID YOU KNOW?

It happened this Month....

- February 4th, 1882 – Poet E.J. Pratt is born in Western Bay, Newfoundland. He is best known for his epic verse *The Titanic*.
- February 8th, 1924 – The Toronto Granite Hockey Club wins Canada's second consecutive Olympic gold medal in ice hockey in Chamonix, France, beating the American team 6 – 1.
- February 10th, 1946 – War brides arrive in Halifax from England. The term “War brides” refers to women who married Canadian servicemen overseas during the Second World War. After the war, the Canadian government provided these women with free sea and rail passage from their original homes to their destinations in Canada, and by 1948, over forty-three thousand wives and more than twenty thousand children had immigrated.
- February 12th, 2010 – the opening ceremony of the Vancouver Winter Olympic Games is held at BC Place Stadium. It was the first indoor ceremony in Olympic history.
- February 13th, 1971 – Hockey Hall of Farmer Mats Sundin was born.
- February 15th, 1965 – Canada's new flag is officially inaugurated in a ceremony on Parliament Hill.
- February 16th, 1970 – The Grey Cup trophy, stolen in December 1969 from the offices of the champion Ottawa Rough Riders, is returned to the Canadian Football League headquarters.
- February 19th, 1996 – The new two-dollar coin, featuring a polar bear on one side and a portrait of Queen Elizabeth II on the other, is introduced by the Royal Canadian Mint to replace the two-dollar banknote.
- February 20th, 1942 – Hockey Hall of Famer Phil Esposito was born
- February 1961 – Singer Rene' Simard was born.

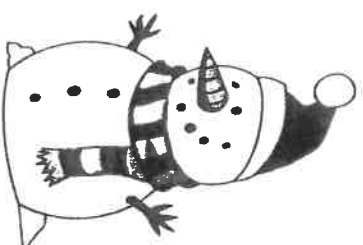

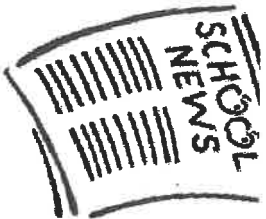

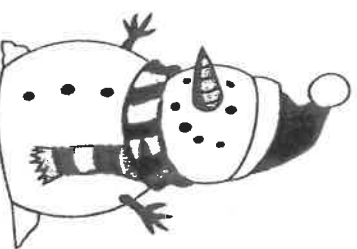

Bartenders with Books

When I dropped into the Buckhorn branch of the Trent Lakes Library the other day, somehow or other, I started ranting about something that was top of mind. Not at the librarians, but with them. Joanne O'Heron, a library assistant at both branches of the Library, took it all in stride, as usual. But I was a little ashamed to behave that way in front of Tina Steed, the new Library CEO. She just laughed and said that librarians are known as "bartenders with books."

Last March I wrote about the Helen Bowen Library in the Cavendish Community Centre (507 Express, March 2024). I was particularly interested in our library because I feel libraries are so important to the growth and health of communities. And our library is an excellent example of that.

So Why Am I Writing about Our Library Again in Less Than a Year?

Librarians also see themselves as community builders. And both our branches are once again really demonstrating that this year. This attitude is not new but this year it has really caught my attention.

The first thing I noticed was an invitation to a levee held at the Buckhorn Branch on January 4. This kind of levee is what used to be known as a morning "assembly or reception of visitors" (Wikipedia) but now might happen at any time of day. It is not a man-made embankment to keep a river from overflowing. What overflowed there was conversation, good feeling and generous servings of tea, coffee and delicious food (both healthy and the traditional celebratory holiday fare). I had an opportunity to chat with both old friends and new acquaintances, including 4 of our 5 Council members and 6 of the 7 Library Board members; all Library staff and most of the volunteers. The Library sure was a happening place that day (January 4).

Clearly, it will also be a happening place lots of other days.

About the same time, Joanne told me about an event the Buckhorn branch is hosting for people to talk to Service Canada about the relatively new dental program. **Yes!** I think the program is wonderful – last year all my dental appointments and work were done without costing me a cent. But I know of many people who qualify for this plan and yet seem to know nothing about it. Therefore, I think the more we can share this important information with our fellow residents who would benefit from it the better.

Unfortunately, by the time you are reading this, that event (February 5) will have passed but, with any luck, I will be able to give you the highlights next month.

Then, on the afternoon of March 5, Joanne mentioned, the OPP will be available at that branch to discuss issues related to their role in our community. I will definitely be there then too. I am particularly concerned about the problem of headlights blinding me to the point that I can no longer safely drive on 507 at night – I understand that I am far from the only person who is disabled by these headlights and am keen to learn what, if anything, the OPP is doing about it or, failing that, what they recommend that you and I can do about it. Another topic that probably interests most of us is what plans there are for reducing the other hazards of 507 – none of us likes to hear of fellow motorists dying on our roads. Equally, experiencing closure of the road during accident investigations is no one's idea of a good way to spend a summer day.

Enough of How The Library is Meeting My Pet Peeves, What Else Is Happening?

For starters, our Helen Bowen branch will:

- open on Tuesdays from 4-8 pm, starting February 4 and continuing at least through to the fall; up until now, as you know, the Library as only been open during various daytime hours; this can restrict access to the books, DVDs, community information and general camaraderie offered by the branch for people working away from Cavendish to Saturdays when there are generally lots of other demands on our time – if you like this idea be sure to show up and get your fill of Library resources on Tuesday nights so this extension can be extended throughout the year

Firehall opens in Cavendish

July 24/81

CATCHACOMA — About 150 cottagers and permanent residents helped celebrate the official opening Saturday of a firehall for Cavendish Township that has no fire trucks. The new firehall is Galway-Cavendish Firehall No. 2 on Highway 507 just south of Beaver Lake Road.

Cavendish continues to rely on portable pumper units that are stored on lakeshore areas and at marinas and used by volunteer firefighters mainly to fight cottage fires.

People with buildings away from bodies of water have to depend on fire-fighting equipment that's 25-kilometres south in Harvey Township or 65-kilometres west in Galway Township. The portable, gasoline-powered pumps don't work unless they're fed by a lake, river or pond.

Galway-Cavendish Councillor Henry Nokes, chairman of the Cavendish fire committee, said he hopes to have a fire department vehicle available soon that can be used to transport the volunteer firefighters to fires. "Your chief difficulty is getting from where you are to where the fire is." In fires where the portable pumps can be used, the firefighters have been using boats, cars or a borrowed truck to get to the fire scene.

"We have fair protection for the cottagers around the lake," Deputy Reeve Jean MacLellan said "but we don't have a pumper for buildings off the lake."

Reeve Carl Brickman said it'll be the new year before Galway-Cavendish Township can afford to get a pumper truck for the new firehall. Donations will be needed to help pay for it, he said. Government grants aren't available for fire equipment Brickman said.

If there's a fire call in Cavendish, the fire truck gets to the scene in time "just to clean up" after the fire, he said.

Mrs. MacLellan said: "By the time they (neighboring firefighters with a fire truck) got up here it (a burning building) would probably be burned to the ground."

Brickman said some of the portable pumps will be moved into the new firehall at the end of August after minor finishing work is done on the hall.

The estimated cost for the firehall and land is \$65,500. The Galway-Cavendish culture and recreation committee, Cavendish subcommittee and the Cavendish volunteer firemen committee have agreed to raise \$16,000 of the cost and have so far raised about \$8,000.

A Canada Works grant for material and labor has provided \$15,640 of the cost; a Young Canada Works labor and material grant which ends in August will provide \$11,685; and \$22,000 is from a township levy.

The new firehall is the home base for 16 volunteer firefighters who work under the direction of Deputy Fire Chief Horace Manktelow.

Nokes said training sessions will be held at the firehall, probably in the fall.

The firehall will also serve as a culture and recreation centre. Brickman said it's the first municipal structure in Cavendish Township.

"For the present you might refer to this building as a multi-use structure," Brickman said in his speech at the official opening, "but it has been formally designated as a firehall, and will be managed by the fire department. That is its first priority..."

Brickman also said the new building is to house a township sand truck "to provide more timely service to the residents of Cavendish during the winter months."

He ended the speech with a few words addressed to the fire department: "... may you have pleasures and much satisfaction from your new home, and I trust that the equipment, when you get some, is not used too frequently, if ever, for other than training and practice sessions."

The Ontario Fire Marshal's Office recommended in 1975 that firefighting be upgraded in Galway-Cavendish, Brickman said. A new firehall was opened in Galway Township in July of 1976 — Galway-Cavendish Firehall No. 1.

Check reported conditions. Before you head onto any ice, check with a local bait shop operator or resort owner for known ice conditions, thin ice areas or dangerous open water conditions.

Avoid travelling on ice at night. Clear hard ice is the only kind of ice recommended for travel; keep away from unfamiliar paths or unknown ice.

Suit up. If you must venture onto the ice, wear a thermal protection buoyant suit to increase your chances of survival if you fall through. If you do not have one, wear a lifejacket/PFD over an ordinary snowmobile suit or layered winter clothing

Avoid:

- Slushy ice
- Thawed ice that has recently refrozen
- Layered or rotten ice caused by sudden temperature changes
- Ice near moving water (i.e. rivers or currents)

Never go on the ice alone. A buddy may be able to rescue you or go for help if you get into difficulty.

Inform someone. Before you leave shore, inform someone of your destination and expected time of return.

Assemble a kit. Assemble a small personal safety kit no larger than the size of a man's wallet to carry with you. The kit should include a lighter, waterproof matches, magnesium fire starter, pocketknife, compass and whistle. You should also carry ice picks, an ice staff, a rope and a cellular phone.

Know what to do if you hear the ice crack:

- Lay down on the ice.
- Call for help loudly and clearly.
- Crawl or roll back to land.

Self-rescue steps:

- Float on your stomach facing the shore.
- Reach forward onto the ice; do not push down on it.
- Kick your legs to slowly push your torso onto the ice.
- Crawl or roll away from the hole.
- If you can't climb onto the ice, float in the water and call for help loudly and clearly.
- Get medical help immediately.

Assisting someone who has fallen through the ice:

- Do not attempt to go on the ice.
- Push or throw a stick, branch, rope or floating aid to the victim.
- It is important to get help fast.
- Call 9-1-1 for expert assistance.
- Remember reach, throw...but do not go!

Snow Fort Dangers

One cubic foot of snow weighs approximately five pounds. If a snow cave or snow fort is six feet under the snow, a collapse could place approximately 1,000 pounds of snow on top of a child. In addition, children should not play in areas where snow removal or clearing are taking place.



Ontario voters head to the polls

TORONTO, January 29, 2025 – Today, Chief Electoral Officer Greg Essensa signed the writs for Ontario’s 44th general election. Voters across the province can cast their ballots starting tomorrow, January 30, until election day on February 27.

Canadian citizens who will be 18 years of age or older on election day are eligible to vote. To make voting faster and easier, voters are encouraged to confirm, update, or add their information to the Register now at RegisterToVoteON.ca so that they will be mailed a voter information card with information on when, where, and how to vote.

There are many days and ways to mark your X in this election, including by mail, at a local election office, and on election day. This election, you can also vote at any advance voting location in your electoral district during three days of advance voting. A request can also be made for a home or hospital visit by those who cannot make it to a voting location or require assistance to vote.

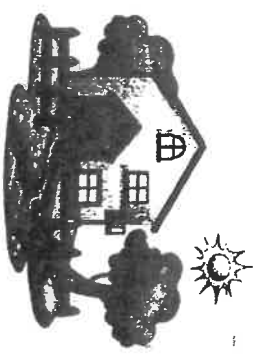

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

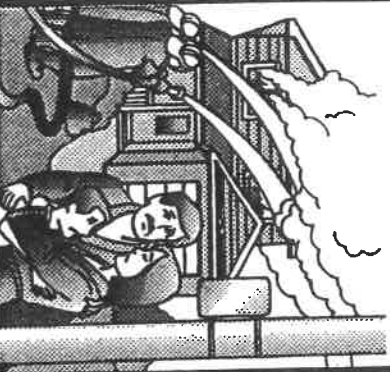
