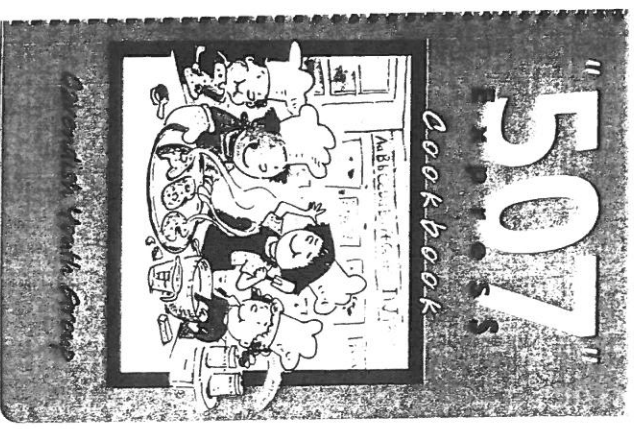

John Ernest Jackson

JACKSON, John

In his 103rd year and after a life filled with simple riches, John Ernest Jackson has peacefully gone to join his love, Lou. John was surrounded by family on May 5th, 2024 following a short stay at Peterborough Regional Health Centre. Born October 3rd, 1921 to Ernie and Bessie Jackson, John spent his earliest years in Orillia. The family moved to Northern Ontario where John and his three sisters came of age in the mines, forests and lakes around Gowganda.

Like his father, John served during World War II. He was stationed at Prince Rupert and held the rank of Gunner.

After the war, he crossed paths with the love of his life, Louise. Together, they built a life, with Lou choosing their house in Whitby and John selecting the lots on Beaver Lake for their family cottage. John ran a construction company and then worked for the Ontario Department of Highways while he and Lou raised their three sons, Michael, Gordon, and Grant.

John retired in 1984 after 31 years of public service and fully embraced cottage life. His love for the outdoors was evident from his collection of boats, canoes, snowmobiles, ATV's and, eventually, his long-awaited backhoe at age 98. He knew the Beaver Lake area like the back of his own hand. After all, it was with his determination and foresight that the final portion of Beaver Lake Road was developed, making road access possible for the north side of the Lake.

True to his honourable nature, John served on the Galway Cavendish Fire Department for many years and was an instrumental part of the Geriatric Construction Co. who built the Cavendish Community Centre. When he wasn't fishing or tinkering on projects, John could be found helping at community events and tending bar at the many functions that brought such vibrancy to the Cavendish community.

Humble and honest, John worked hard but also enjoyed life to its fullest. He had a sharp sense of humour with blue eyes that would dance when he laughed. He loved Country & Western music, fishing and teasing everyone he could.

John was predeceased by his wife, Lillian (Louise) Jackson (née Fox); parents, Ernest Grant Jackson and Elizabeth (Bessie) Jackson (née Ballantyne); and sisters, Minnie Dick, Edna Jackson and Jean Jackson. He is survived by sons, J. Michael, Gordon (Elaine) and Grant; granddaughters, Tina (Tim Lamont), Amanda (James McWilliam), Lisa and Laura; and great-grandchildren, Jacob, Leah, Sarah, Mason and Liam. He is also survived by a new family member, Christine. He will be missed, too, by nephew, Paul Dick (Cheryl); grandniece, Lyndsay Jackson; grandnephew, Jordan Dick; and great-grandniece, Lillian Jackson.

John's long life was a testament to good living. His legacy lives on in the Cavendish community and in our hearts.

How to prevent Forest Fires

You are responsible for the fires you start. Be careful to only start a fire when the conditions allow the fire to burn safely and remember to extinguish it correctly. If you cause a wildland fire, you could be charged under the Forest Fires Prevention Act and may be held responsible for the cost of putting out the fire.

- Pick a site close to a water source and sheltered from the wind.
- Build your fire on bare rock, bare dirt or other non-combustible material
- Build your fire at least one metre away from any flammable materials
- Make sure the space above the fire is at least three metres from overhanging branches and vegetation.
- Clear a space about two metres wide for the fire.
- Remove pine needles, grass, leaves and twigs.
- Ensure you have a pail of water and a shovel to control the fire.
- Remember that small fires are safer, easier to control and easier to put out.
- A small fire will also keep cooking tools from blackening and let you get close enough to cook.
- Never leave a campfire unattended.
- Remember that you are responsible for tending your campfire, ensuring it is kept under control and for putting it out.
- Pour water on your fire, stir the ashes, repeat until the ashes are cold to touch, the ashes don't hiss and no more smoke comes from the fire.
- Never allow children to play with matches or fireworks
- Teach your children to tell an adult immediately if they see a fire burning out of control.
- Fire to be no larger than 2 feet by 2 feet
- Fire must be 25 feet from any lot line, building, structure, trees or combustible materials
- Burn only from 6 p.m. to 8 a.m. from April 1st to October 31st
- All fire must be extinguished completely before leaving the scene, no fire may be left burning.

SENIOR HEALTH RECOVERY

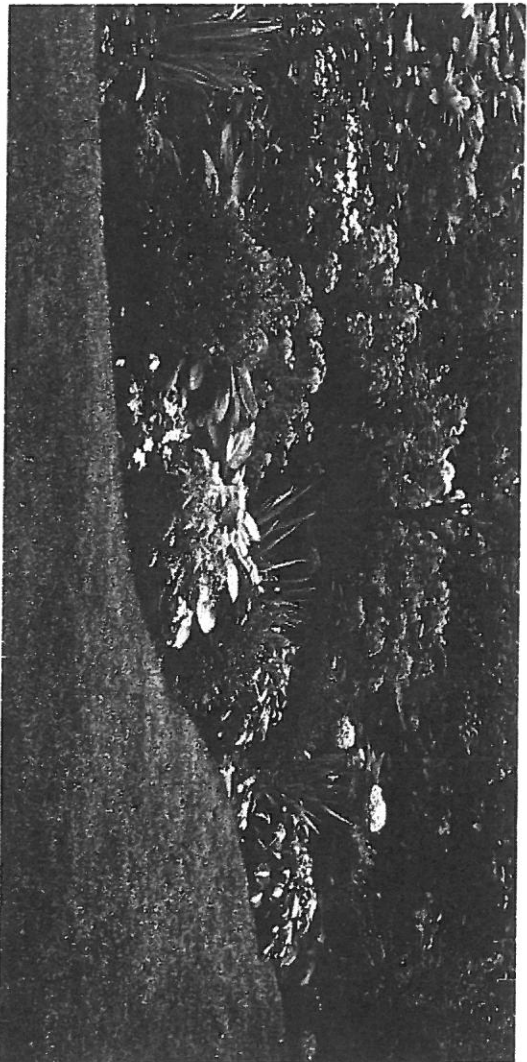

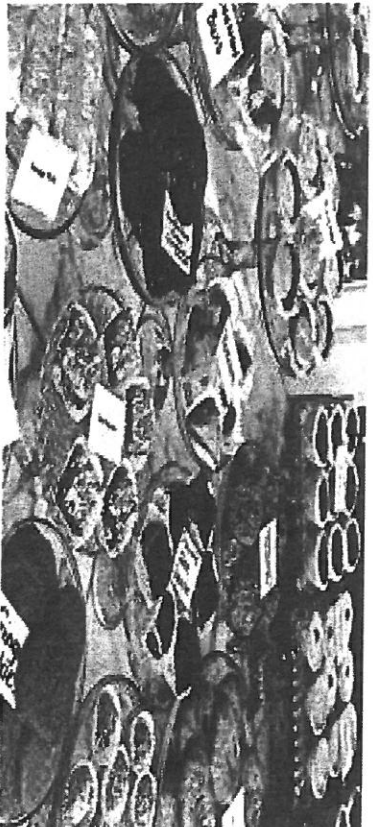

Recipe of the Month

CHICKEN CURRY

2 Tbsp (30 mL) butter
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 1/2 cups (375 mL) chopped apples
1/2 cup (125 mL) chopped onions

1 tsp (5 mL) salt
1 Tbsp (15 mL) curry powder
2 Tbsp (30 mL) flour
2 cups (500 mL) light cream
2 cups (500 mL) cooked diced chicken

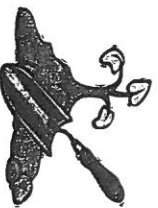

Gardening Tips

- Plant tomatoes, potatoes and celery
- Plant dahlias, Begonias, gladiolas and other tender bulbs
- Preserve moisture in gardens by applying mulch.
- Treat lawns for insect if present.
- Chinch bugs may be active in late June
- Apply Fruit Tree Spray to fruit trees.
- Be sure to remove flower heads from Lilacs and Rhododendrons and then fertilize for next year's blooms.
- For blooms next year, start perennials from seed; Delphiniums, Lupins, Gaillardias, etc.
- Fertilize your roses and spray with Funginex if weather is wet and humid.
- Prune Forsythia and other early spring flowering shrubs after they have completed flowering.
- Prune evergreens for shape | mid-June
- Fertilizing evergreens, lawns, gardens and hedges is still important.
- Don't forget your hanging baskets and containers.
- Remove persistent lawn weeds.

It happened this Month....

- June 1st, 1823 – Geologist Henry Hind was born
- June 4th, 1838 – The first recorded baseball-type game in North America is played in Beachville, Upper Canada (near Woodstock, Ontario. The game – between teams from the townships of Oxford and Zorra – featured five bases and took place on a square field in a pasture.
- June 9th, 1882 – Bluenose captain Angus Walters was born
- June 13th, 1898 – An Act of Parliament makes Yukon a separate territory. The territory's name comes from the Gwich'in word Yu-kun-ah, for the "great river" that drains most of its area.
- June 15th, 1809 – Poet Francois-Xavier Garneau born.
- June 18th, 1964 – Quebec's Bill 16 comes into effect, permitting women to enter legal contracts without the consent of their husband. Prior to this, a married woman essentially had the legal status of a minor; she was dependent on her husband's approval.
- June 20th, 1857 – hydroelectricity advocate Adam Beck was born.

Weather predictions for this month.

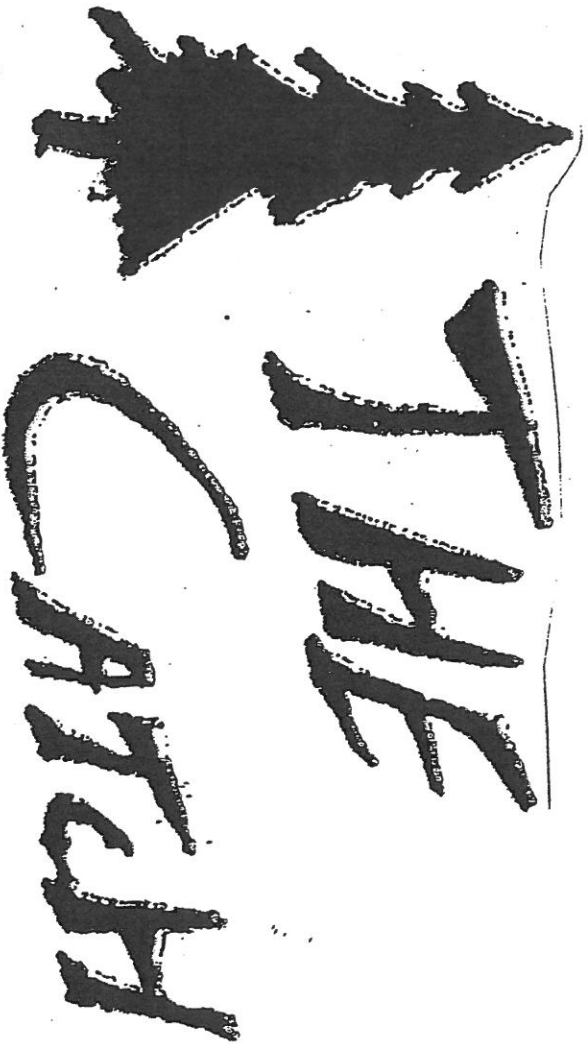
HOUSEHOLD HINTS

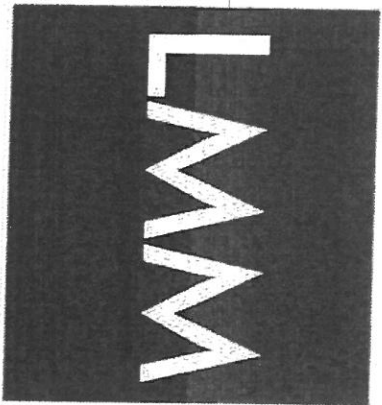

West Nile Virus Confirmed in Local Bird

Peterborough Public Health is advising the public that a local bird has tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV). The bird was found dead in the Peterborough region early in May and submitted for testing.

Birds and mosquitoes can carry and be a host for WNV. During the summer months and early fall, PPH sets traps weekly throughout the City and County of Peterborough to gather mosquito specimens for WNV testing. In 2023, no mosquitoes tested in the Peterborough region were positive for WNV, but there were confirmed human cases in Ontario.

The majority of WNV cases do not show symptoms. About 20% of infected people may have a mild flu-like illness with fever, headache, and body aches, occasionally with a skin rash and swollen lymph nodes or other non-specific symptoms that last several days. Other symptoms may include nausea, vomiting, or eye pain. Less than one percent of infected people will develop neuro-invasive disease, with older age groups and males disproportionately affected.

To prevent WNV,

- Avoid interacting with dead birds
 - If one is found on your property, use a shovel and gloves to pick it up and double bag it.
 - Report the bird to [Canadian Wildlife Health Cooperative](#)
 - Thoroughly wash hands with soap and water
- Prevent mosquito bites
 - Cover up when going outside between the hours of dusk and dawn
 - Use insect repellent containing DEET or icaridin, following manufacturer's instructions
 - Remove brush and standing water from property as they use this as a habitat
