What Makes a Community? In Our Case, a Fire Hall and a Library

We are all familiar with the Cavendish Community Centre – a large, nicely landscaped building with a big red roof on the east side of 507, in the midst of a fire hall, a police building, a hockey arena, a roads depot, a baseball diamond and other open spaces that double as volleyball and pickle ball courts, and parking auctions, parties, meetings, funerals and, most of all, a library – the Helen Bowen Branch Library And what happens in that community centre? - weddings, pot luck suppers, hidden auctions, Loonie

suddenly there was a fire hall pretty much in the middle of nowhere! telephone or television. In the case of my family cottage, we'd only had "indoor plumbing" for 7 years. And needs were met by a fire tower at the south end of Mississagua Lake, which primarily kept an eye out for forest fires, as we called them. We'd had Hydro for only about 25 years and most of us still did not have a Road turnoff. At the time, this felt like an invasion of civilization. Until about 1970, our fire management I am old enough to remember when there was no community centre in Cavendish, also no fire hall and, of course, no library. It all started in 1981 when a fire hall was built on the highway near the Beaver Lake

The middle of nowhere was a good description of Cavendish in any case. Not only did it contain no village let alone a town, there was no gathering of homes or businesses of any sort. The only place to purchase gas or food or matches (or even essentials like coffee filters!) were the marinas scattered along the west shores of Mississagua and Catchacoma lakes. Some years, one or another of these marinas might add a restaurant to serve actual meals.

a parishioner. With it, he and his sister Mary Walker (generally known as Aunt Polly) purchased that cottage property. The Walkers had 5 children, all of whom either bought property in the bay or spent a lot of the good weather visiting it. In 1952, the minister and his wife bought a Peterborough Lumber prefab father, a notable Presbyterian minister named William James Walker, had received a bequest of \$500 from cottager named Helen Bowen. Mrs Bowen's parents had bought property on Baldwin Bay in 1951. Her So, now there's a fire hall – other than providing local fire fighting capacity, what difference did that make? Well, it may not have made much difference at all, except for the presence and industry of a Catchacoma ever since, everyone in the family has just kept on improving it.

In next to no time, she had permission from both the Buckhorn Library (where, naturally, she had been a frequent visitor) and the Fire Department to install bookshelves for a branch library. Lloyd built hinged shelves that could be folded Once the fire hall appeared, Helen had an inspiration – maybe the Fire Department would let her use the

successful library. There was a good mix of patrons – cottagers, permanent residents, children. And, before you knew it, other people got the idea that they too could hold meetings, play card games and pursue other activities in the fire hall. But, after a while, the trucks were outside so much in the winter that the Fire Department feared the water in them might freeze! By 1990, it was obvious that the time had come to build the long-intended Cavendish Community Centre course, many others helped her. I have no doubt that in the process, they learned much about how to run a The "Cavendish Library" opened in the winter of 1986-87. Helen acted as the librarian at first but, of

Culture and Recreation Committee. So, with lots of input from all members of the committee, he drew up the plans for the centre. After those plans were finalized by an architect, Lloyd joined several other local At that time, to construct the building. Of course, the new centre included a dedicated library , Lloyd was a volunteer fire fighter for the Cavendish Hall and chairperson of the Cavendish

Library Committee. The next year, the library was appropriately named the Helen Bowen Branch Library, after the retired cottager who, working alongside her husband and other members of the community, left Cavendish better than they had found it. We are all very fortunate that she and Lloyd came to cottage in Helen and Lloyd were pleased to realize the role they had in creating the community centre and the community itself. And, they also realized the importance of stepping back and letting the community take over responsibility for the library. So, in September 1996, after serving for 11 years, they resigned from the
