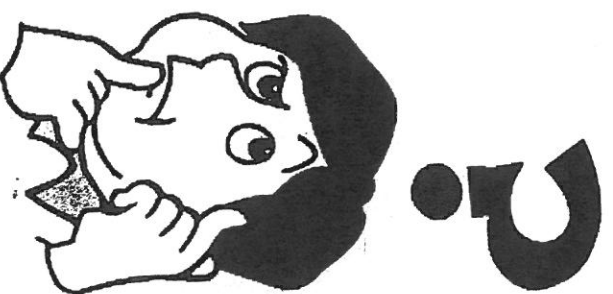

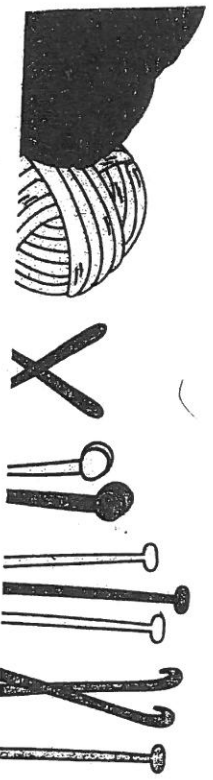

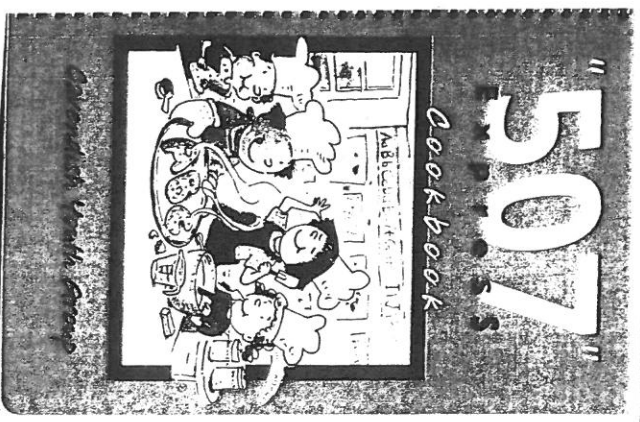

The day before the sale - set up at the CCC – tables/plants – 1.5 hours

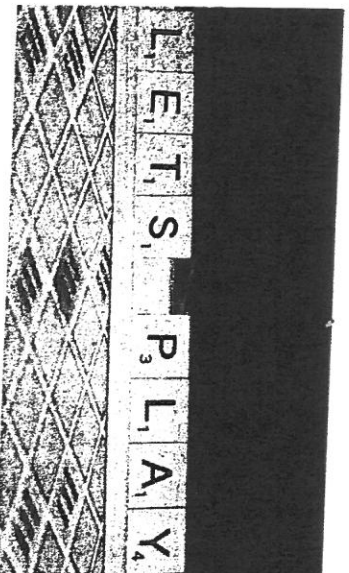
- put the SALE signs out on 507 – 1 hour

# It's a Part of Our History

## Manley's Landing

In the beginning it was Fred Crawford's family who first owned this property, nestled into a cove at the foot of the bay on the north end of Catchacoma Lake. Fred had inherited the property from his father, who had received it as a land grant for his participation in the Boer War. He opened a small summer general store there and with the help of his son Brian, they operated a dock-to-dock service selling canned goods to the few cottagers who were on the lake during the early 1950's. In 1955, just a year after starting his business, Fred sold the property to Gord and Eletha Manley, an energetic couple who had just sold their own property north of Catchacoma on Clear Lake (known today as Picard Lake) to Robert Drude, proprietor of Drude Mines.

Gord had originally come to the area in 1936 when he came to truck for his brother-in-law, Joe Robertson. In 1943 he, his wife and their two small children moved to the area and lived in a small shack near to Green's Lake until the spring of 1944 when they moved to Clear Lake to a lot they had purchased from the Peterborough Lumber company. The new home had three rooms with a root cellar style foundation. Mrs. Manley could tell you tales of the snow sometimes coming through the walls.

Gord's main livelihood was to trap in the spring and fall for beaver, fisher, otter, muskrat and racoon. He also sold and split hardwood cords. A cord of wood as explained by Gord, measures 4x4x8. It had to be cut in 16" lengths to fit in the wood stoves. A cord of wood in 1944 brought \$8.00. Work horses were used to skid the logs and to plow the two miles from their home to the main road in the winter. In the off season he picked up work at the Read Brothers Lumber Company.

The Manley's quickly turned their new property into a thriving summer business complete with general store, parking, docking and boat storage. In the early 1970's they turned the store into a rental cottage and turned a small building at the lakeshore into a tuck shop that carried everything from bread and canned goods to penny candy and frozen treats.

As the years passed, and Gord and Eletha grew older they stared to wind down the business and in 1977 they put the Landing up for sale.

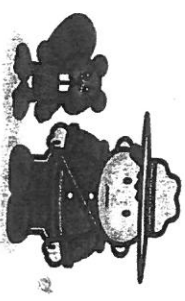
**Don't Move Fast Anymore**

## It happened this Month....

- March 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1916 – Ontario's Temperance Act passes, making it illegal to possess alcohol (except in a private dwelling) and to sell it in the form of a beverage.
- March 5<sup>th</sup>, 1940 – Politician Nellie Cournoyea was born
- March 8<sup>th</sup>, 1867 – The British North America Act is approved by the British Parliament and given royal assent by Queen Victoria on March 29<sup>th</sup>. It came into effect on July 1<sup>st</sup>, now celebrated as Canada Day.
- March 10<sup>th</sup>, 1861 – Poet Pauline Johnson was born.
- March 14<sup>th</sup>, 1793 – Chloe Cooley, an enslaved Black woman from Queenstown in Upper Canada, now Ontario, in captured and sold across the Niagara River in New York State. The incident helped Lieutenant-Governor John Graves Simcoe to introduce legislation to abolish slavery in the region and pass the Act to Limit Slavery in Upper Canada on July 9<sup>th</sup>, 1793.
- March 16<sup>th</sup>, 1931 – Singer Patricia Rideout-Rosenberg was born.
- March 20<sup>th</sup>, 1907 – Novelist Hugh MacLennan is born in Glace Bay, Nova Scotia. The five time recipient of the governor general's Literary Ward was deeply influenced by the event of the First World War.
- March 25<sup>th</sup> – 1593 – Jesuit missionary Jean de Brebeuf was born.
- March 27<sup>th</sup> – 1962 – Singer-songwriter Jann Arden is born in Calgary.
- March 30<sup>th</sup>, 1954 – the Young Street subway, the first subway line in Canada, is opened by Ontario premier Leslie Frost, Toronto mayor Allan Lamport, and members of the Toronto Transit Commission at Davisville station. The line ran for 7.4 kilometres between Eglinton and Union stations.



## Smoke Alarms

Most fatal fires occur at night when people are asleep. Often, victims never wake up. Working smoke alarms give you the precious time you need to escape a fire. By law, every home in Ontario must have a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas.

It is the home owner's responsibility to install and maintain smoke alarms on every storey of their home and outside sleeping areas. It is the landlord's responsibility to ensure their rental properties comply with the law. If you are a tenant of a rental property and do not have the required number of smoke alarms, contact your landlord immediately. It is against the law for tenants to remove the batteries or tamper with the alarm in any way.

Smoke alarms area available with different features and applications, so choosing the right alarm can be confusing. Some of the features to consider include:

- Smoke alarms can be powered electrically, by batteries or both. If you are installing an electrically powered alarm, we recommend that it have a battery backup in case of power failure.
- Most smoke alarms employ either ionization or photo-electric technology. Ionization alarms may respond slightly faster to flaming-type fires. Photo-electric alarms may be quicker at detecting slow, smouldering fires. Consider having both types of alarms in your home. When purchasing smoke alarms, make sure they have the logo of a recognized standards testing agency, such as CSA or ULC, to ensure they meet Canadian performance standards.
- Smoke alarms with a pause button are highly recommended. The pause feature permits the alarm to be temporarily silenced without disconnecting the power source.

Smoke alarms must be installed on each storey of the home and outside sleeping areas. Because smoke rises, smoke alarms should be installed on the ceiling. If this is not possible, install the alarm high up on a wall. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions when installing smoke alarms.

Avoid putting smoke alarms too close to:

- Bathrooms
- Windows
- Ceiling fans
- Heating and cooking appliances

Test your smoke alarms every month by using the test button on the alarm. When the test button is pressed, the alarm should sound. If it fails to sound, make sure that the battery is installed correctly or install a new battery. If the alarm still fails to sound, replace the smoke alarm with a new one.

Install a new battery at least once a year, or as recommended by the manufacturer. Install a new battery if the low-battery warning sound or if the alarm fails to sound when tested.

Dust can clog your smoke alarms. Battery-powered smoke alarms should be cleaned by opening the cover of the alarm and gently vacuuming the inside with a soft bristle brush. For electrically connected smoke alarms, first shut of the power to the unit, and then gently vacuum the outside vents of the alarm only. Turn the power back on and test the alarm.

All smoke alarms wear out. Replace them every 10 years according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Steam from the shower, oven, stove or toaster can cause smoke alarms to activate. If these type of nuisance alarms occur, **do not remove the battery.** To reduce nuisance alarms:

- Relocate the alarm, moving the alarm a short distance can make the difference.
- Install a smoke alarm with a pause button that will allow you to temporarily silence the alarm.
- Replace alarms located near kitchens with photo-electric types

## Burn Permits

Burn Permits are required - You must have a permit for ANY open air burning. Fire Permits are available on line through the Municipality of Trent Lakes web site or phone 705-738-3800 extension #301 or 1-800-374-4009 Extension #301.

## What Makes a Community? In Our Case, a Fire Hall and a Library

*As our library website notes, according to Albert Einstein, “The only thing that you absolutely have to know is the location of the library.”*

We are all familiar with the Cavendish Community Centre – a large, nicely landscaped building with a big red roof on the east side of 507, in the midst of a fire hall, a police building, a hockey arena, a roads depot, a baseball diamond and other open spaces that double as volleyball and pickle ball courts, and parking lots. And what happens in that community centre? – weddings, pot luck suppers, hidden auctions, Loonie auctions, parties, meetings, funerals and, most of all, a library – the Helen Bowen Branch Library.

I am old enough to remember when there was no community centre in Cavendish, also no fire hall and, of course, no library. It all started in 1981 when a fire hall was built on the highway near the Beaver Lake Road turnoff. At the time, this felt like an invasion of civilization. Until about 1970, our fire management needs were met by a fire tower at the south end of Mississauga Lake, which primarily kept an eye out for forest fires, as we called them. We'd had Hydro for only about 25 years and most of us still did not have a telephone or television. In the case of my family cottage, we'd only had “indoor plumbing” for 7 years. And suddenly there was a fire hall pretty much in the middle of nowhere!

The middle of nowhere was a good description of Cavendish in any case. Not only did it contain no village let alone a town, there was no gathering of homes or businesses of any sort. The only place to purchase gas or food or matches (or even essentials like coffee filters!) were the marinas scattered along the west shores of Mississauga and Catchacoma lakes. Some years, one or another of these marinas might add a restaurant to serve actual meals.

So, now there's a fire hall – other than providing local fire fighting capacity, what difference did that make? Well, it may not have made much difference at all, except for the presence and industry of a Catchacoma cottager named Helen Bowen. Mrs Bowen's parents had bought property on Baldwin Bay in 1951. Her father, a notable Presbyterian minister named William James Walker, had received a bequest of \$500 from a parishioner. With it, he and his sister Mary Walker (generally known as Aunt Polly) purchased that cottage property. The Walkers had 5 children, all of whom either bought property in the bay or spent a lot of the good weather visiting it. In 1952, the minister and his wife bought a Peterborough Lumber prefab and, ever since, everyone in the family has just kept on improving it.

One of the Walker daughters was Helen Bowen. Mrs Bowen was a teacher who had trained to be a librarian after her children had grown up. She was funny, energetic and quirky, as well as a delightful storyteller. When Helen and her husband Lloyd (who had an engineering background) retired in the mid-1970s, they bought Aunt Polly's cottage and moved up to Catchacoma. Helen loved books, as one might expect of a librarian. She liked to keep all the books she had ever owned but happily exchanged them with other interested people.

Once the fire hall appeared, Helen had an inspiration – maybe the Fire Department would let her use the space from time to time for a lending library. Clearly, bureaucracy did not deter her. In next to no time, she had permission from both the Buckhorn Library (where, naturally, she had been a frequent visitor) and the Fire Department to install bookshelves for a branch library. Lloyd built hinged shelves that could be folded together and rolled into a corner when they were not in use.

The “Cavendish Library” opened in the winter of 1986-87. Helen acted as the librarian at first but, of course, many others helped her. I have no doubt that in the process, they learned much about how to run a successful library. There was a good mix of patrons – cottagers, permanent residents, children. And, before you knew it, other people got the idea that they too could hold meetings, play card games and pursue other activities in the fire hall. But, after a while, the trucks were outside so much in the winter that the Fire Department feared the water in them might freeze! By 1990, it was obvious that the time had come to build the long-intended Cavendish Community Centre.

At that time, Lloyd was a volunteer fire fighter for the Cavendish Hall and chairperson of the Cavendish Culture and Recreation Committee. So, with lots of input from all members of the committee, he drew up the plans for the centre. After those plans were finalized by an architect, Lloyd joined several other local “geriatrics” to construct the building. Of course, the new centre included a dedicated library.

Helen and Lloyd were pleased to realize the role they had in creating the community centre and the community itself. And, they also realized the importance of stepping back and letting the community take over responsibility for the library. So, in September 1996, after serving for 11 years, they resigned from the Library Committee. The next year, the library was appropriately named the Helen Bowen Branch Library, after the retired cottager who, working alongside her husband and other members of the community, left Cavendish better than they had found it. We are all very fortunate that she and Lloyd came to cottage in Cavendish.

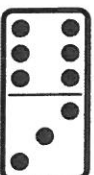

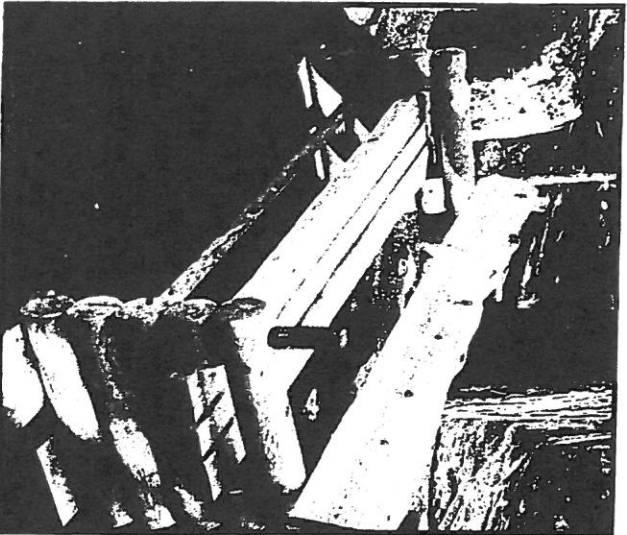


## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

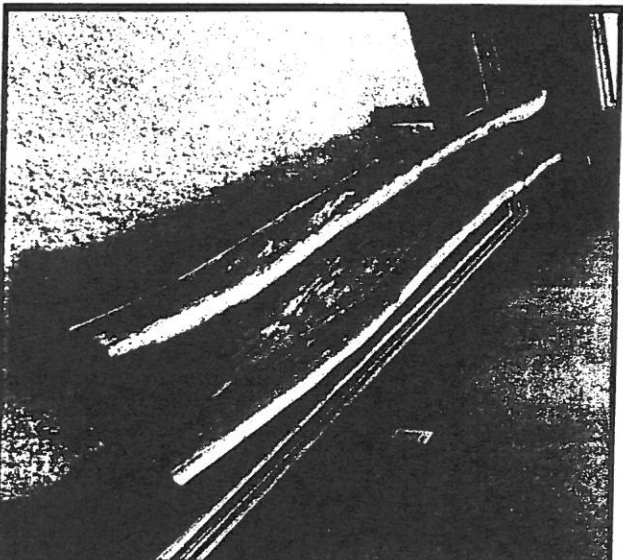
- Pour a mixture of salt and of water down kitchen sink to prevent grease from collecting in drains.

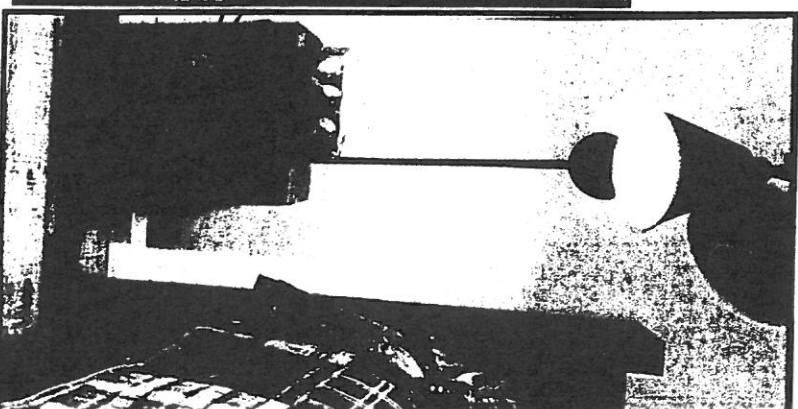

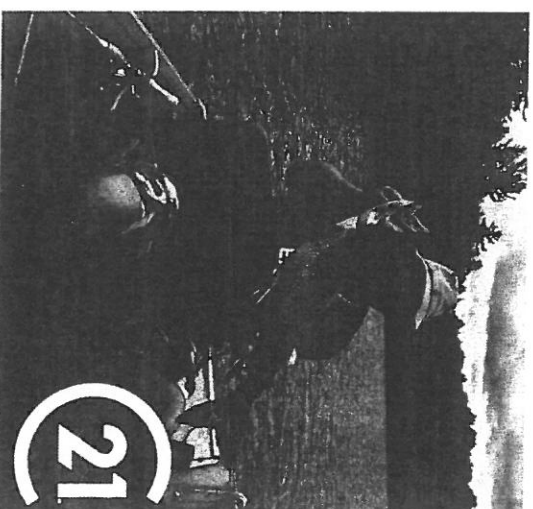

## Recipe of the Month

### SPONGE CANDY

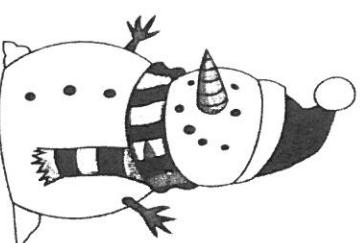
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 1 Tbsp cider vinegar
- 1 Tbsp baking soda

In a 2 quart pot, heat sugar, corn syrup and vinegar to boiling over medium heat, stirring constantly until sugar is dissolved. Boil, without stirring, to 300°F on candy thermometer or until small amounts of mixture, dropped into very cold water, separates into threads that are hard and brittle. Remove from heat and quickly stir in baking soda thoroughly. Pour into ungreased 13x9x2 inch pan. Do not spread. Cool and break into pieces. Makes about 3 dozen. 50 calories.

## Gardening Tips

Prune fruit trees to open centers and remove weak growth. Kill overwintering insects and diseases on fruit trees and deciduous ornamentals with organic dormant spray. Increase the feeding of houseplants as the day lengthen. Check the yard for winter damaged heaved plants and broken branches. Plant annual flower seeds: Petunias, Snapdragons, Calendula, Verbena and Dahlia. Snow Pansies, Coleus and geraniums, under lights at the first of the month.
