





Using fireworks

- To minimize the risk of fire and burn injury, the fire service does not recommend family fireworks or informal neighbourhood displays
- The fire service recommends attending public fireworks displays hosted by your municipality or other responsible organization.
- If you still choose to have a family fireworks or informal neighbourhood display, are some important safety tips to follow: check with your local fire department about regulations regarding fireworks. Here
- Appoint a responsible person to be in charge. Only adults who are aware the hazards and essential safety precautions should handle and discharge fireworks.
- 0 Carefully read and follow the label directions on fireworks packaging
- 0 fireworks. Always keep a water hose or pail of water close by when discharging
- 0 trees and dry grass Discharge fireworks well away from combustible materials like buildings,
- 0 Keep onlookers a safe distance away, upwind from where fireworks are discharged.
- 0 Light only one firework at a time and only when they are on the ground Dispose of them in a metal container. fireworks, it is best to wait 30 minutes and soak them in a bucket of water. Never try to light a firework in your hand or re-light dud fireworks. For dud
- 0 Discharge fireworks only if wind conditions do not create a safety hazard.
- 0 wire remains hot for some minutes after burnout, immediately soak it in ignite clothing, cause blindness and result in severe burns. As the sparkler Keep sparklers away from children. Sparklers burn extremely hot and can water to avoid injury.
- 0 If someone gets burned, run cool water over the wound for three to five minutes and sook madic
