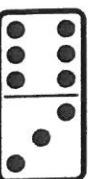

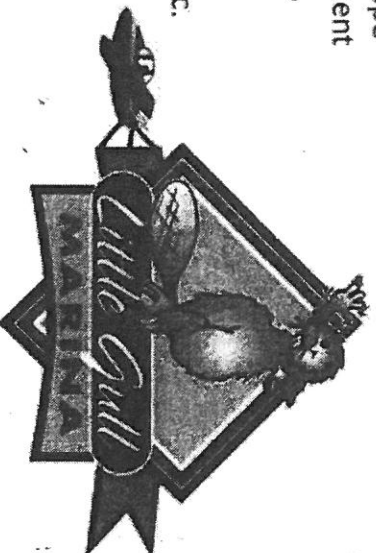

DEPUTY MAYOR UPDATE

Highlights of Trent Lakes Council Meetings
June - August 2024

➤ The new Environmental Advisory Committee has developed an ambitious Workplan. Priorities are:

- **Water Management** - Establish and Maintain General Practices for Managing Trent Lakes Water Bodies
- **Forest Protection**, Preservation, and Inventory - Establish and Maintain General Practices for Managing Trent Lakes Forests
- **Natural Heritage** Strategy - Consolidate existing data and newly obtained inventories to create a Natural Heritage Strategy
- **Dark Sky** Certification - Ensure that Trent Lakes Participates in Actions that Improve the Quality of the Nighttime Environment
- **Emergency Management Plan** - Ensure Emergency Management Plan is Accessible and Effective
- **Engage With Experts**
- Monitor and Expedite Implementation of **Trent Lakes Climate Action Plan** and Promote Achievements
- **COMPLETE!** Review Policies, Staff Reports, and Plans with **Environmental Lens**. A new section has been added to every staff report: "Environmental Implications"

➤ Flood mapping and modeling of 300 properties along the Miskwad Ziibi and Nogies Creek are complete. Flood Map Report

➤ A revised and comprehensive Building Bylaw has been developed and published. B2024-045 Building Bylaw

➤ All municipal road signs (273) will be upgraded for accessibility, compliance (includes high contrast between letters and background, fonts with distinct and not decorative letters, as well as initial uppercase). New dedicated mechanics/recreation and facilities building on Cty Rd 409 is on schedule for completion this fall and on budget.

➤ The Trent Lakes 2024 Energy Conservation and Demand Management assessment and plan has been completed. GHG emissions have been reduced 20% since 2019. Energy Management Plan

➤ The Trent Lakes Police Services Board is transitioning to the replacement Peterborough Police detachment Board. Councillor Braybrook continues as our representative.

➤ County Road 507 traffic and accidents are a continuing issue. A speed indicator sign has been put in place; Photo Radar has been requested; a Road Safety Audit will be done by the County, EMS and OPP (Recommendations focus on the three E's: engineering, education and enforcement); Planned rehabilitation of the section from Cty Rd 36 to Mississauga Dam Road in 2027 will consider safety features. 507 accident report and plans

➤ The Final Buckhorn Community Improvement Plan has been approved. Buckhorn CIP

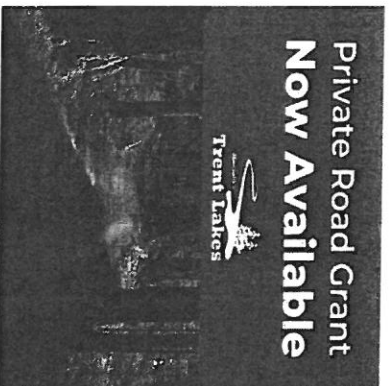
➤ The Short Term Rental Working Group is deliberating over next steps, based on public input and the experience of other municipalities. A start report will be presented September 17th.

Q2 2024 SUMMARY REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- **\$1,222,320** was awarded through delegated purchasing authority through Corporate Services.
- Q2 included a gain of 675 social media followers to **4,183** and there were **56,036** visits to the Municipality's website.
- Over **1,000** people have already subscribed to the municipal e-newsletter.
- **113** building permits were issued YTD (up 20% YOY), and **625** inspections conducted (up 1%).
- Q2 Bylaw complaints were up **15%**.
- Fire and Emergency Services call volumes remain high, with a slight decrease in YOY incidents. Over 50% of calls were at the Buckhorn fire station. **6** more firefighters have now completed NFPA Firefighter 1 & 11.
- **1347** Burn Permits were issued YTD
- **538.8** tonnes of garbage were accepted YTD, flat over 2023.
- **30** participants cleaned 15 roads in Trent Lakes collecting 75 bags of garbage during our Spring campaign.
- Rec and Facilities staff completed **626** work orders taking **944** hours.
- Under **Green Initiatives**, the new Trent Lakes Tanker truck was delivered which carries 1600 more gallons of water than the truck it is replacing, self-watering geranium barrels have been introduced and there were several diversion programs for mattress disposal, paper shredding and bulky plastics.

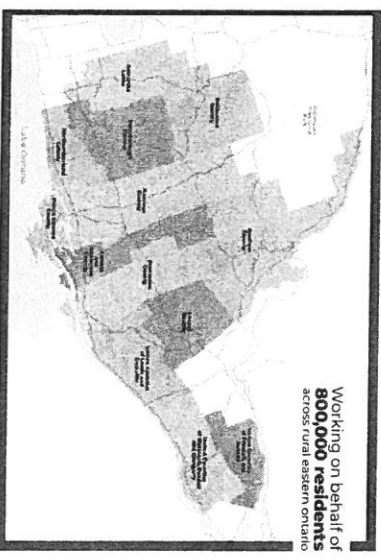

This is a new program to assist residents on private roads. These grants (max \$3,000 per road association, total budget \$30,000) will assist property owners with costs for the maintenance of private roads (e.g., road grading, tree removal and trimming, noxious weed control, gravel, dust control, roadside mowing, road drainage, road reconstruction, road surfacing and winter maintenance), resulting in better accessibility and safety for the traffic.

ENERGY CONSERVATION AND DEMAND MANAGEMENT PLAN

Under Ontario Regulation 25/23– Broader Public Sector: Energy Reporting and Conservation and Demand Management Plan – each municipality must report on its energy usage, its Green House Gas emissions and initiatives to reduce these, every five years. Trent Lakes objectives are to:

- Institutionalize energy efficiency and low carbon thinking into the organization;
- Enhance operational efficiency of existing buildings;
- Build Municipal facilities to ensure high environmental performance;
- Improve environmental performance of existing Municipal facilities; and,
- Utilize renewable energy sources.

The Municipality accomplishes these through ongoing replacement and upgrade of lights, appliances, furnaces and other equipment with energy efficient alternatives. As Public Works and Fire structures are replaced per the strategic master plan, significant reductions will be achieved in energy output and GHFF emissions.

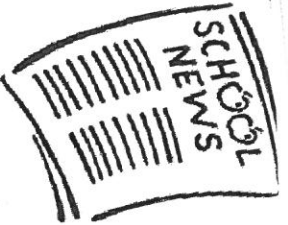

New Provincial Legislation: A mobile device is any personal electronic device that can be used to communicate such as a lap top, cell phone, tablet or smart watch.

All devices must be stored out of view during a school day.

Grades K – 8 may not use mobile devices during school day including recess
Grades 9 – 12 may use only during breaks

Exceptions to this legislation are:

- Health and medical purposes
- Support special education needs
- Educational purposes as directed by educator

Prepare now

Take the following steps so you and your family are prepared in the event of a forest fire:

- Review and discuss the safety tips with your entire household to make sure everyone understands what to do in a forest/wildland fire.
- Clearly mark all driveway entrances and display your address so that fire vehicles can easily find your home.
- Practice evacuating your home. Teach all household members the technique of “**stop, drop and roll**” in case clothes catch on fire.
- Install smoke detectors and sprinklers on every floor and by all sleeping areas.
- Plan several escape routes away from your home by car and by foot.
- Create a safety zone around your home. Modify or eliminate brush, trees and other vegetation that could spread fire.

Using fireworks

- To minimize the risk of fire and burn injury, the fire service does not recommend family fireworks or informal neighbourhood displays.
- The fire service recommends attending public fireworks displays hosted by your municipality or other responsible organization.
- If you still choose to have a family fireworks or informal neighbourhood display, check with your local fire department about regulations regarding fireworks. Here are some important safety tips to follow:
 - Appoint a responsible person to be in charge. Only adults who are aware of the hazards and essential safety precautions should handle and discharge fireworks.
 - Carefully read and follow the label directions on fireworks packaging.
 - Always keep a water hose or pail of water close by when discharging fireworks.
 - Discharge fireworks well away from combustible materials like buildings, trees and dry grass.
 - Keep onlookers a safe distance away, upwind from where fireworks are discharged.
 - Light only one firework at a time and only when they are on the ground. Never try to light a firework in your hand or re-light dud fireworks. For dud fireworks, it is best to wait 30 minutes and soak them in a bucket of water. Dispose of them in a metal container.
 - Discharge fireworks only if wind conditions do not create a safety hazard.

- Keep sparklers away from children. Sparklers burn extremely hot and can ignite clothing, cause blindness and result in severe burns. As the sparkler wire remains hot for some minutes after burnout, immediately soak it in water to avoid injury.

- If someone gets burned, run cool water over the wound for three to five

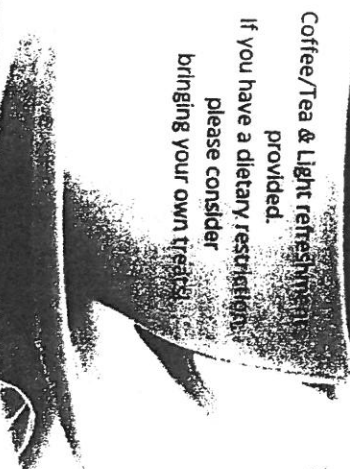

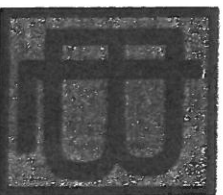

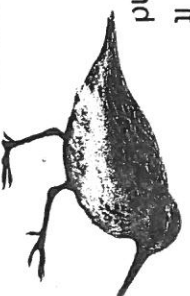

Climate Change and our Bird Population

Climate change is having an effect on birds around the world. Not only do they suffer from habitat destruction and pollution but now they face the dangers caused by the climate crisis.

Birds are very unique creatures from feathers to hollow bones, powerful hearts, extra-efficient lungs and their ability to fly between continents. Unfortunately one in eight bird species is threatened with extinction and most are seeing their populations declining. As the world becomes hotter and drier, it could mean migrating birds show up at their destination more exhausted and weaker the they would in the past, which means that they are less likely to survive and reproduce.



Birds respond to longer days and other cues in the spring so they can start up their reproductive system and breed. In late summer or fall they shut down this system so they can prepare to migrate, or for those that don't migrate, prepare for the winter. Birds often time their egg-laying so the chicks hatch when food will be most available. If the barometric pressure changes the birds respond by eating more and putting on fat preparing to sit out a storm that could stop them from finding food. If a storm hits more than once a week the birds have difficulty storing enough fat to survive.

As our world changes so does that of the birds. The timing and patterns of their movements are changing along with the climate. Changing temperature, humidity and wind conditions, as well as changes in habitat are all things that are affecting the birds of our world. We are all experiencing the changes in our climate and how the seasons are changing but have you ever thought about how it is affecting the birds and other species that share this place with us?

THE CANADA GOOSE

There are at least eleven different species of Canada goose. The smallest, the cackling goose, weighs about 2 kilograms and lives in the Arctic. The largest, the giant Canada goose, weighs around 7 kilograms.

The Canada goose seems to have adapted to living alongside humans. In suburban areas, the geese are safe from both natural predators and hunters. There are currently at least seven million Canada geese in North America, and although half a million are killed in Canada each year by hunters, their numbers are stable or increasing.

Canada Goose is a successful brand of Canadian-made winter parkas and other outdoor clothing. The coats have become so popular that they're frequently counterfeited. The company now sews holograms into its garments to prove their authenticity.



A half a million years ago, the Canada goose settled in Hawaii, where it evolved into a giant species that seems to have been on its way to becoming flightless. The bird was hunted to extinction soon after humans arrived on the islands. A smaller descendant, the Hawaiian goose (more commonly called the nene), is the official state bird of Hawaii.

The collective noun for geese is gaggle; when flying close together they are called a plump.

The Canada goose has a long lifespan. A number of wild birds have lived for over thirty years.

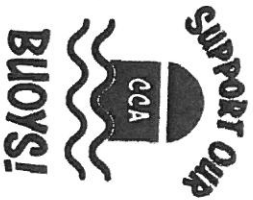


Gardening Tips

- Plant spring flowering bulbs. Daffodils do better if planted early.
- Transplant and divide midsummer blooming perennials.
- Move Hibiscus, Oleander and Geraniums indoors before frost for winter blooms and cuttings.
- Save your favourite annuals by taking cuttings and potting up indoors.
- This is an ideal planting time for trees, shrubs and evergreens. Use a transplant fertilizer for best results.
- Lift bulbs and corms of frost-sensitive plants (Dahlia, Gladiolus and Canna Lilies, Etc.) Dry, and dust with fungicide and store.
- Purchase Mums, Fall Asters and Ornamental kale to replace annual flowers.

It happened this Month....

- September 1st, 1915 – Children's author Barbara Smucker was born
- September 4th, 1972 – Montreal Museum of Fine Arts was robbed of \$2 million worth of paintings and other art objects. The largest art heist in Canadian History.
- September 7th, 1979 – Singer-songwriter, violinist, and composer Owen Pallett was born.
- September 11th, 2001 – Approximately three thousand individual, including at least twenty-four Canadians, are killed when the World Trade Center and the Pentagon are attacked by terrorist group.
- September 13th, 1799 – Governor of Canada Lord Sydenham (Charles Poulett Thomson) was born.
- September 19th, 2007 – A landmark compensation deal for former residential school students comes into effect. The last residential school remained open until 1996.
- September 21st, 1902 – Hockey hall of Famer Howie Morenz was born.
- September 23rd, 1992 – Goalie Manon Rheauume becomes the first woman to play professional hockey in the NHL when she hits the ice for the Tampa Bay Lightning in an exhibition game against the St. Louis Blues.
- September 26th, 1984 – tennis player Frank Dancevic was born.
- September 27th, 1888 – Stanley Park, the largest of Vancouver's two hundred or so parks is opened. It was also the site of military training for some three hundred members of the Canadian women's Army corps during the Second World War.

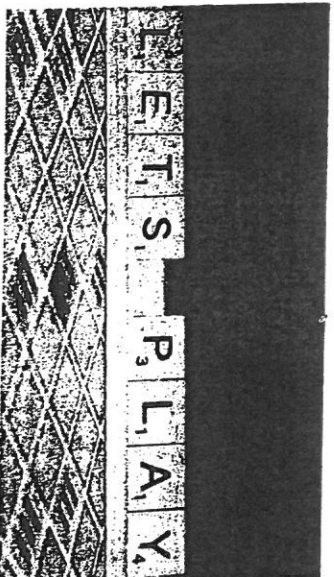

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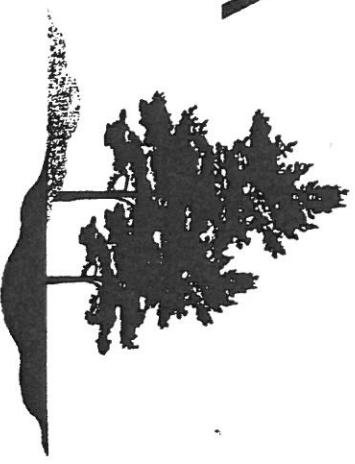

Recipe of the Month



CRISPY FRUIT PIZZA

| Fruit | |
| 1 cup whipping cream | Topping: |
| 2 tsp sugar | 8 oz softened cream cheese |
| 1/2 tsp vanilla | 2 cups icing sugar |
| Crust: | 1/4 cup cocoa |
| 1/4 cup butter | Glaze: |
| 32 large marshmallows | 2 Tbsp apricot jam |
| 5 cups crispy rice cereal | 1 1/2 tsp water |

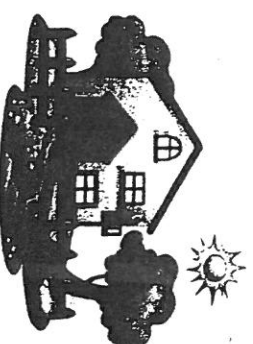
Crust: Combine butter and marshmallows in a saucepan, stirring often on medium/low heat until melted (you may also microwave). Remove saucepan from heat. Add the cereal and stir until well coated. Press into a greased pizza pan and cool.

Topping: Place cream cheese, icing sugar and cocoa in a small bowl. Beat until smooth. Spread over cooled pizza base.

Arrange fruit over chocolate topping in a fancy design.

Glaze: Mix jam and water together. With a pastry brush, dab the fruit with jam mixture to glaze and prevent fruit from turning brown.

Beat whipping cream, sugar and vanilla until thickened. Put a dab of whipped topping on pizza and cut into wedges.



HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Brush your toilet frequently. Baking soda is effective, also deodorizes the bowl.
- Clean your countertop with diluted mixture of hot water and vinegar. It will not only smell sweeter, but will repel ants and flies.
- A few drops of lemon juice will shine your shoes when you run out of shoe polish.
- To get grease off soup, gravy or stew, while still hot, drop an ice cube in the liquid. Grease will collect around the cube and can be spooned out easily.
- To help eliminate the smell of cabbage cooking add 1 teaspoon vinegar to the cooking water.
- Use club soda to remove coffee stains from laundry.
- Add 1/4 cup of vinegar to your washing machine as a fabric softener.
- Gum on your child's shirt — put the item in the freezer. Once frozen it can be scraped or peeled off.
- Have a sore throat — chop a clove of garlic, sprinkle with salt, chew and swallow.
- Are your shoes smelly? Sprinkle with a little baking soda and let stand overnight. Vacuum in the morning.

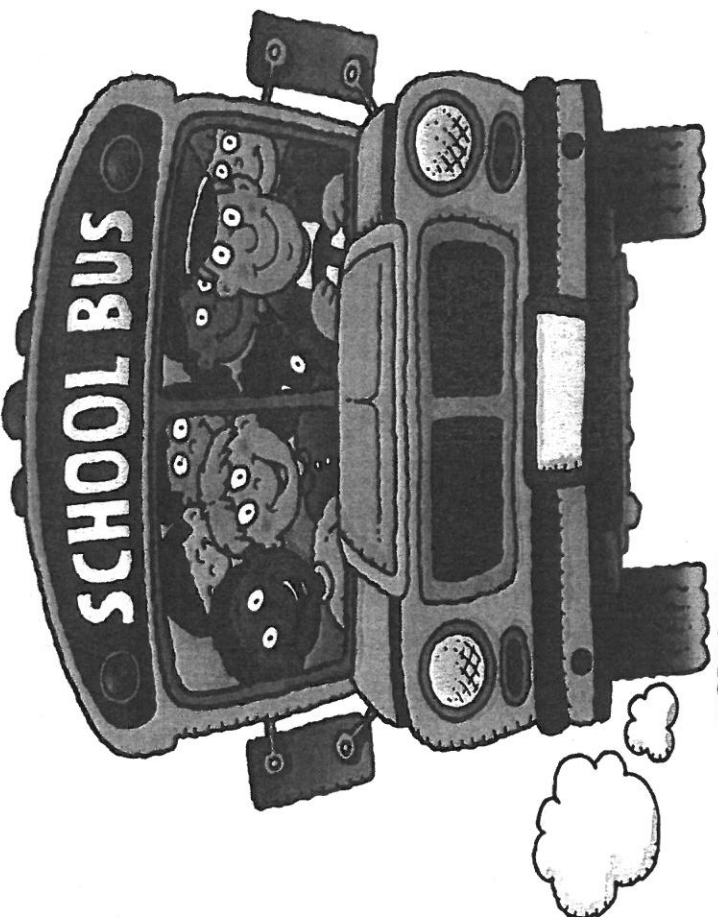
