Passing the Buck / The Buck Stops Here – most men in the early west carried a jack knife made by the Buck knife company. When playing pokier it was common to place one of these Buck knives in front of the dealer so that everyone knew who he was. When it was time for a new dealer the deck of cards and the knife were given to the new dealer. If this person didn't want to deal he would "pass the buck" to the next player. If that player accepted then "the buck stopped there".

Cobweb – the Old English word for "spider" was "cob".

Sleep Tight – early beds were made with a wooden frame. Ropes were tied across the frame in a criss-cross pattern. A straw mattress was then put on top of the ropes. Over time the ropes stretched, causing the bed to sag. The owner would then tighten the ropes to get a better night's sleep.

Over a Barrel – in the days before CPR a drowning victim would be placed face down over a barrel and the barrel would be rolled back and forth in an effort to empty the lungs of water. It was rarely effective. If you are over a barrel you are in deep trouble.

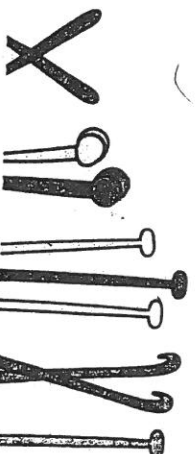

The cookbook is available at the Cavendish Library, Flynn's Store and Little Gull Marina. Cost of the cookbook is \$15.00



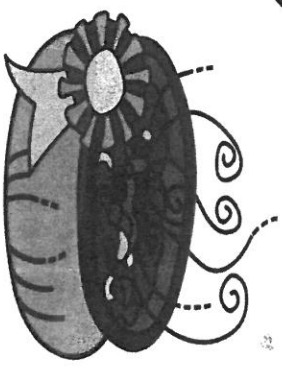

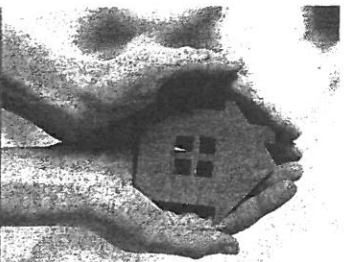
Red Lion (con't)

During the early 1960's, five log cabins were built on the property, and a "honeymoon suite" was added a short time later. Outdoor theatre productions presented by George Luscombe's well-known Little Theatre in the Woods troupe were another attraction, and the riding stable with its seven horses added yet another attractive addition for their guests.

Over the years came more addition as and improvements: a 20x 40 foot heated outdoor swimming pool filled with what was proudly described as "50,000 gallons of crystal clear Cavendish water, tennis courts, cross-country ski equipment rentals and trails and a new riding stable complete with sleeping quarters for the help.

They did a great job promoting our area with fishing, swimming, sunbathing walking on the many trails, and hunting for rocks in the spring and summer. Hunting, walks to enjoy the beautiful fall colours, ice fishing, skating on their own rink complete with music and night lights and sleigh rides with a horse and cutter, cross-country skiing, and their stables to be enjoyed in the fall and the winter. No matter the season one chose to visit the Inn one may listen to the silence in pleasant company and the friendly hospitality extended. The peaceful, old-world atmosphere was a welcome change. Evenings playing checkers, cribbage, dominoes, scrabble or cards, or gather around the player piano for an evening of music were enjoyed by many.

The Coppys eventually sold the Red Lion to Cameron and Patricia Gray, who ran the business in a similar fashion until 1980, when they closed it and moved out of the area. The Inn itself has been dismantled and most of the other buildings are long gone.

The day before the sale - set up at the CCC – tables/plants – 1.5 hours

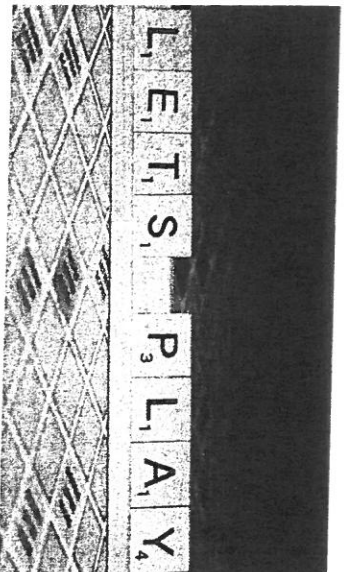
- put the SALE signs out on 507 – 1 hour

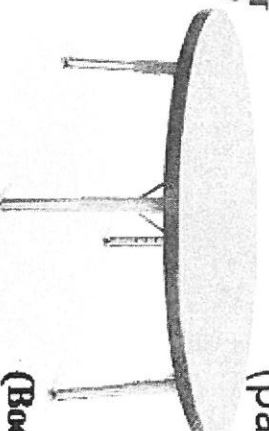
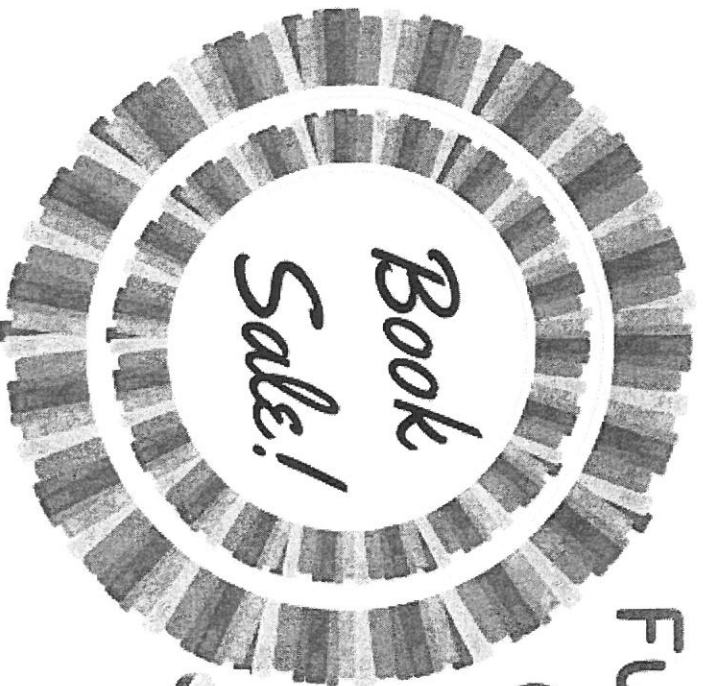

Peterborough County 2024 Community Recognition Awards

The Corporation of the County of Peterborough invites nominations for the **Peterborough County 2024 Community Recognition Awards**. Nominations will be accepted for any permanent or seasonal resident or group residing in the County of Peterborough who has raised the profile or made an extraordinary contribution to our community. The nominee shall not have received a Peterborough County Community Recognition Award for the same category within the last fifteen years.

Unless otherwise indicated, there shall be one award for each Township in each category noted below for 2024. Nominations will be received in the following categories:

- **Accessibility Recognition** - A group, individual or business who has contributed to accessibility improvements within the County of Peterborough (one County-wide award).
- **Acts of Heroism** - An individual who has displayed bravery in the face of personal risk, injury or death at an incident that took place either in the County of Peterborough or was to the benefit of a Peterborough County resident and which action did not occur while the individual was acting in his/her professional capacity while on duty (unlimited awards).
- **Agricultural Leadership** - Any individual or farm enterprise is eligible to be nominated in this category. Factors that will be used to assess the nomination will include such items as innovations, agricultural promotion and the recognition brought to the County through its operation. It may include involvement in agricultural organizations. Leadership in the agricultural community will also be considered.
- **Business Leadership** - Any new and successful initiatives of both new and established businesses that have made outstanding contributions to the County, including tourism promotion.
- **Community Volunteer of the Year** - Any group or individual who has demonstrated community involvement or volunteerism within the County.
- **Environmental/Sustainability Recognition** - Nominees will have demonstrated innovation and/or leadership in environmental conservation, stewardship, and sustainability by having:
 - Developed innovative green technologies or
 - Started businesses to support and encourage sustainable living or
 - Donated conservation lands or easements or
 - Undertaken ecosystem restoration or research or
 - Educated others about the importance of protecting the environment or
- Achieved the overall vision for sustainability through one of the identified theme areas set out in the Sustainable Peterborough Plan: Agriculture and Local Food; Climate Change; Cultural Assets; Economic Development and Employment; Healthy Communities; Land Use Planning; Natural Assets; Energy; Transportation; Waste; and Water (one County-wide award)
- **Heritage Preservation** - An individual or group who has promoted heritage and preserves the history of Peterborough County. This could include, but is not limited to, Fair boards, Women's Institutes, historical societies, etc. A community, public or private organization which has reached a significant milestone such as 100th anniversary of the organization is also eligible for this award. (Birthdays and anniversaries will be recognized on an on-going basis as requested) (One County-wide award)
- **Leadership in Arts and Culture** - A group or individual who has demonstrated excellence in the arts and brought recognition to the County.
- **Sporting Excellence** - Any team or individual who has won a provincial, national, or international sporting event (one County-wide award).
- **Youth** - A person aged 25 years or younger who has contributed to the betterment of the community and/or school environment.

Nomination forms are available from the County of Peterborough office located at 470 Water Street, Peterborough, from any Local Municipal Office, Township Fire Chiefs, local Police Services Boards, schools, libraries throughout the County, area Chambers of Commerce, Community Care organizations or visit our website [Peterborough County Community Recognition Awards Nomination Form](https://www.peterborough.ca/CommunityRecognitionAwards) and complete the nomination online. Nominations will be accepted online, by delivery, fax, mail or email up to and including March 1st for review and recommendation by the Awards and Bursaries Committee to County Council. The Community Recognition Awards Ceremony will take place on **Thursday, May 16th, 2024, at 6:30 p.m.** and will be hosted by the Township of Douro-Dummer at the Douro Community Centre, 2893 Highway 28, Douro-Dummer. 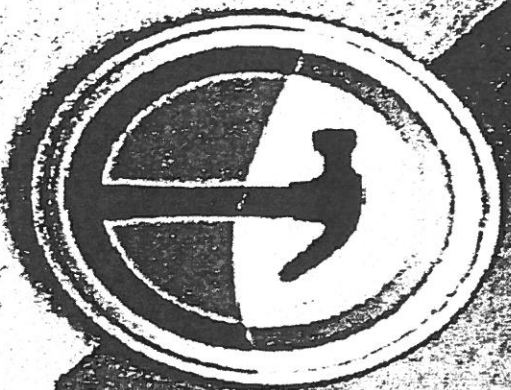

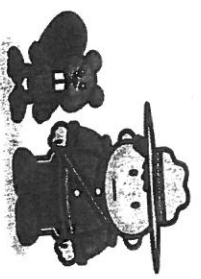


POTATO BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

- | | |
|---------------------------|--|
| 1 1/2 lb (675 g) potatoes | 1/4 tsp (1 mL) pepper |
| 1/4 cup (50 mL) butter | 1 lb (450 g) broccoli |
| 3 Tbsp (45 mL) flour | 1/2 cup (125 mL) grated
Parmesan cheese |
| 2 1/2 cups (625 mL) milk | |
| 1/2 tsp (2 mL) salt | |

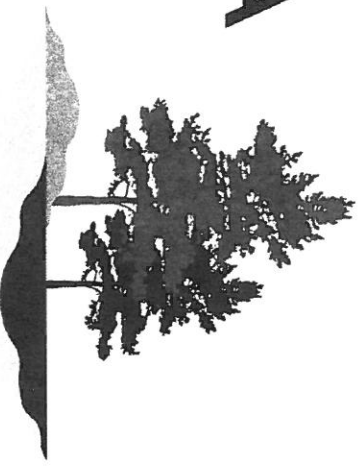
Preheat oven to 350° F (180° C). Wash potatoes; pare. Cut into very thin slices. Heat butter in saucepan. Sprinkle with flour; cook 2 minutes. Add milk and seasonings; simmer until boiling. Remove from heat. In large greased casserole dish, layer potatoes, alternating with sauce and broccoli pieces. Finish with top layer of sauce. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake, covered, 15 minutes. Continue to bake 5 minutes longer, uncovered. Remove from oven; cool 5 minutes. Serve. Makes 6 servings.

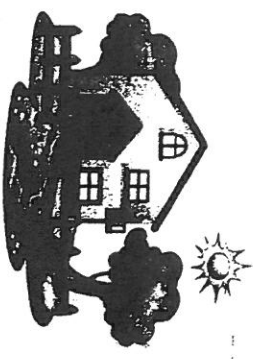

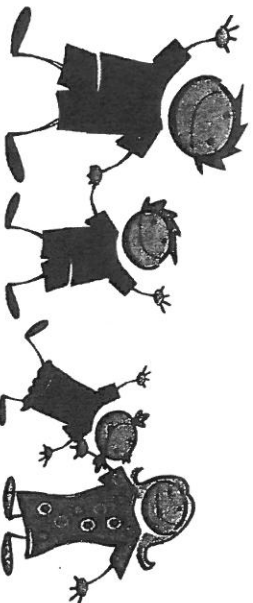
HOUSEHOLD HINTS

- Add a teaspoon of vinegar to water when boiling potatoes to keep them white.
- Rub seasoned vinegar and oil on steaks for increased flavor and tenderness; let stand for several hours, then cook.
- Eliminate unpleasant cooking odors by simmering a mixture of vinegar and water
- Relieve dry skin by adding a few tablespoons of vinegar to bathwater.
- Eliminate doggy odor and add shine to a canine coat by adding a cup of white vinegar to pet's rinse water, then drying.
- In winter, wipe car windows with a solution of 3 parts white vinegar, 1 part water, to reduce frost and ice build-up.
- To remove rim deposits from flower pots and planters, soak them in white vinegar for several hours.
- Pour a cup or two of white vinegar into toilet bowl; let sit for several hours, then scrub with toilet brush to shine, sanitize, and deodorize.
- Polish silver with a paste of cornstarch and water. Apply, dry and buff.
- Sprinkling cornstarch on a difficult knot will make it untangle more easily.

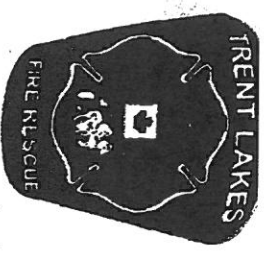

Fire Safety at Home

Everyone has a responsibility to keep their families and homes safe from fire. The best ways to ensure fire safety include:

- Prevent fires from starting
- Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in your home and outside al sleeping areas
- Plan and practice a home fire escape plan so everyone in the home know exactly what to do should the smoke alarms sound in an emergency
- Consider installing residential sprinklers when building a new home or doing extensive renovations.

If a fire occurred in your home tonight, would your family be able to get out safely? It is important that everyone know what to do and where to go when the smoke alarm sounds. Take a few minutes to make a home fire escape plan, by following these steps.

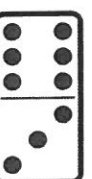
1. Draw a floor plan of your home – be sure to include a plan for each level of your house.
2. Include all possible emergency exits. Draw in all doors, windows and stairways. This will show you and your family all possible escape routes at a glance. Include any features, such as the roof of a garage or porch, that would help in your escape.
3. Show two ways out of every room, if possible. The door will be the main exit from each room. However, if the door is blocked by smoke or fire, choose an alternate escape route, which could be a window. Make sure that all windows can open easily and that everyone know how to escape through them to safety. If windows have security bars, make sure they have a quick release.
4. Identify anyone who need help to escape. Decide in advance who will help the very young, older adults or people with disabilities in your household. A few minutes of planning will save valuable seconds in a real emergency.
5. Choose a meeting place outside a safe distance from your home that everyone will remember, for example:
 - A tree
 - A street light
 - A neighbour's houseIn case of a fire, everyone will go directly to this meeting place so they can be accounted for.
6. Call the fire department from outside your home. Don't waste valuable seconds calling the fire department from inside your home. Once you have safely escaped, call the fire department from a cell phone or from a neighbour's home.
7. Practice your escape. Review the plan with everyone in your household. Walk through the escape routes for each room with the entire family. Use this walk-through exercise to check your escape routes, making sure all exits are practical and easy to use. Hold a fire drill twice a year and time how long it takes. In a real fire, you must react without hesitation as your escape routes may be quickly blocked by smoke or flames.

Driving Near Emergency Vehicles

Learn what to do when an emergency vehicle approaches you on the road.

Types of emergency vehicles

When driving, pay attention to emergency vehicles such as:

- Police cars
- Firetrucks
- Ambulances
- Tow Trucks

When an emergency vehicle approaches

Follow these steps to allow the vehicle to pass by:

1. Slow down
2. Signal
3. Move to the right side of the road, clear of any intersection
4. Stop

When the emergency vehicle has passed, check to make sure the way is clear and signal before merging back into traffic.

Moving over safely

There may be situations where you will need to move your vehicle out of the way. For instance:

- On highways, pull as close as you can to the right side of the road but don't drive on or block the shoulder lane.
- In an intersection, do not make a left turn. Proceed straight through and then pull to the right and stop.
- On a one-way street, you can pull to the left side of the road if you are unable to move to the right.

When approaching a **stopped emergency vehicle**, slow down and pass with caution. If a road has two or more lanes, you must leave a lane of space between you and the emergency vehicle, if you can do so safely.

Penalties

Drivers can be charged if they do not slow down or move over when it is safe to do so. Drivers can face the following penalties:

First offence

- Fines ranging from \$400 to \$2,000
- Three demerit points if convicted
- Possible suspension of driver's licence for up to two years

Subsequent offences (within five years)

- fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$4,000
- 3 demerit points if convicted
- Possible jail time of up to 6 months
- Possible suspension of driver's licence for up to two years

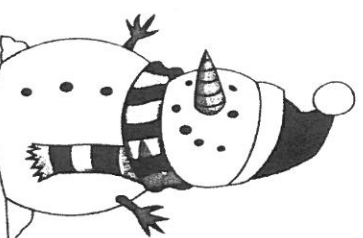
It is also illegal to follow within 150 metres of a fire vehicle or ambulance responding to a call.

Peterborough Public Health Transferring Delivery of Safe Sewage Program

Municipalities to Assume Responsibility for Permitting & Inspections

Changes are coming to the permitting and inspection process for onsite sewage systems in the City and County of Peterborough. After November 17, 2024, Peterborough Public Health (PPH) will no longer oversee the delivery of these services in the region as responsibility for permitting and inspections are transferred to local municipalities.

“Peterborough Public Health has provided these building inspection services related to onsite sewage systems for over forty years, but we are now only one of eleven public health units offering this service,” said Julie Bromley, Chief Building Official and Manager of Environmental Health for Peterborough Public Health.

Board of Health Chair Councillor Kathryn Wilson said: “This decision by the Board of Health was challenging, given the long-standing positive relationships with residents served by this program and the dedicated work of our staff in this area. The transfer supports a one-stop-shop for residents and builders at municipal building departments and allows Peterborough Public Health to focus on our core work, as mandated by the Ontario Public Health Standards in a period of inadequate provincial funding for our core work.”

Peterborough Public Health is working closely with all municipalities that will return to delivery of this service to ensure a smooth transition for building departments and minimize disruptions to residents and industry experts. The transition will occur over two phases.

Phase 1: Effective April 1, 2024, the following municipalities will receive all *new* applications and activities related to onsite sewage systems:

- Township of Cavan Monaghan
- Township of Otonabee-South Monaghan
- Township of Selwyn
- Municipality of Trent Lakes

Phase 2: Effective November 18, 2024, the following municipalities will receive all *new* applications and activities related to onsite sewage systems:

- Township of Asphodel-Norwood
- Township of Havelock-Belmont-Methuen
- City of Peterborough

Peterborough Public Health will continue to oversee open permits and applications for all seven local municipalities outlined above until November 17, 2024. After this deadline, any outstanding files will be transferred to the applicable municipality.

The Townships of North Kawartha and Douro-Dummer already oversee activities related to sewage systems. As such, there will be no changes in these municipalities.

Residents who have open applications or permits with Peterborough Public Health will be contacted with further information and direction on closing their application. 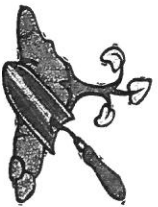

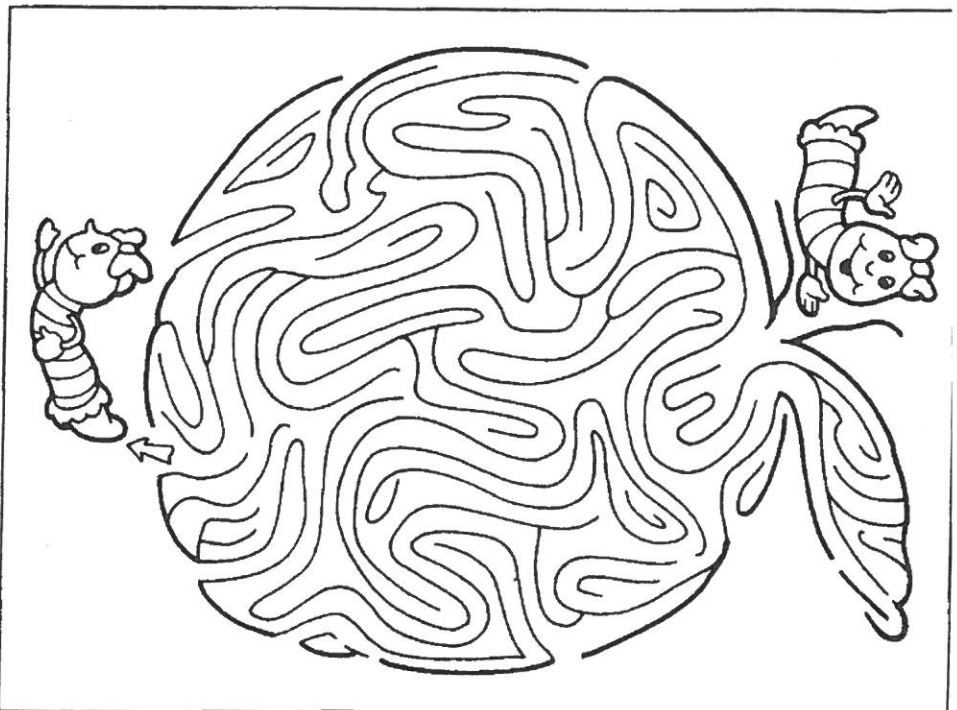

Weather predictions for this month.

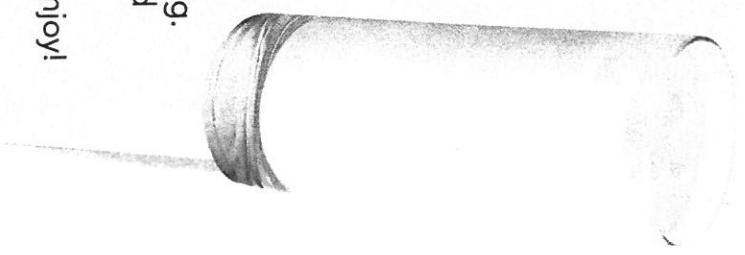

Smooth Sunshine Drink

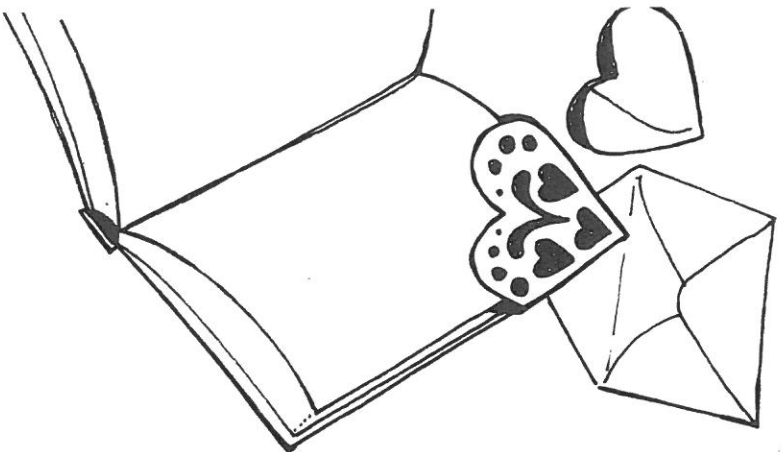
- 125 mL (½ cup) of orange juice

2. Pour into a cup and enjoy!

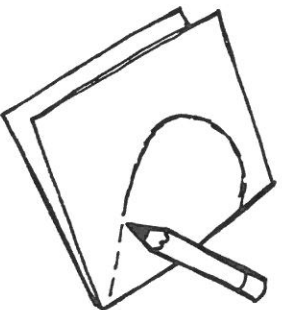

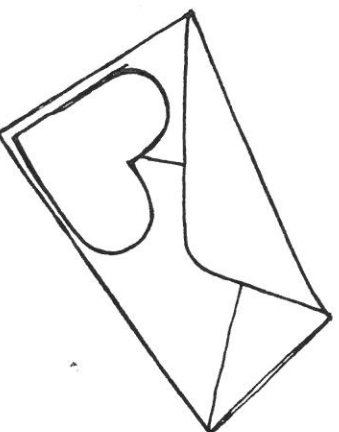
Here's a great way to recycle used greeting-card and junk-mail envelopes.



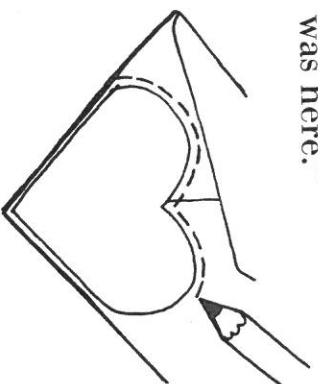
1. Fold the scrap paper in half. Along the fold line, draw and cut out half a medium-sized heart.

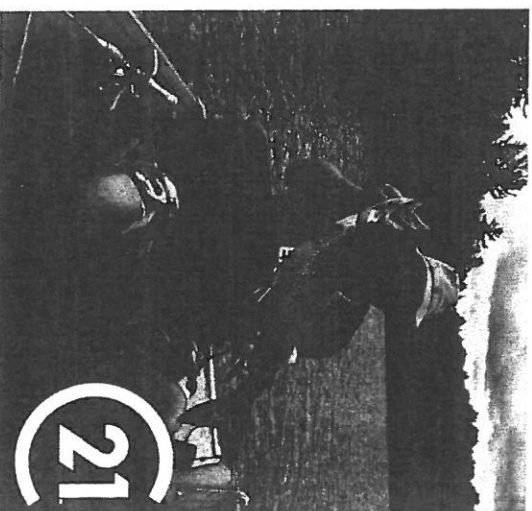

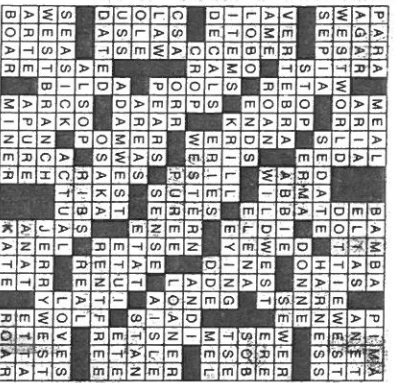

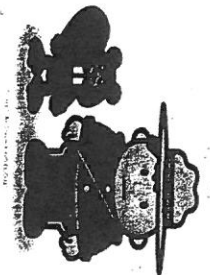
